# Major General Barry M. Goldwater

---

Senator Goldwater has not only distinguished himself as a true statesman in national political circles through many years of service in the U.S. Senate but also as a pilot and a Major General in the Air Force Reserve. He is highly respected for his flying service in World War II with the Air Transport Command and, since then, for the wide number of different types of high-performance aircraft he has flown. General Goldwater, now retired from the Air Force Reserve, has accumulated thousands of pilot hours.

He was born in Phoenix, Arizona, in 1909 and educated at Stanton Military Academy, Virginia, and the University of Arizona.

He was first elected to the U.S. Senate in 1952 and is presently (1981) active. In 1964, he was the Republican presidential nominee, being defeated by Lyndon B. Johnson. He was re-elected to the Senate in 1968 and assigned to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Senate Aeronautical and Space Sciences Committee. In 1974 he was assigned to the Select Committee on Intelligence. In 1977 the Aeronautical and Space Science Committee was abolished under a Senate reorganization and the Senator became a member of the Commerce Science and Transportation Committee.

In 1977 Senator Goldwater was appointed to the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian Institute.

Being a pilot with broad experience in both war and peace, the Senator is very knowledgeable of national defense matters. Accordingly, his service on the Senate Armed Services Committee has been outstanding and effective over many years.

The Senator has had many important assignments in the Air Force in both war and peace. He was Group Commander of the 90th Air Base Squadron; Chief of Staff, Fourth Air Force, and others. He participated in the first flight of P-47s across the North Atlantic in 1943. He served as Chief Pilot, Air Transport Command in the Azores, Casablanca, and Karachi, India. He was the first non-rated test pilot to fly the U-2, SR-71 and B-1. He retired from the Air Force in 1967 after 37 years of both active and inactive reserve duty. He was a Member of the Board of Visitors, U.S. Air Force Academy (1979).


